SPECIAL REGISTRATION PROCEDURES FOR VISITORS AND TEMPORARY RESIDENTS

The United States has a proud tradition of welcoming immigrants and visitors. This tradition is renewed and enriched by each and every law-abiding immigrant and visitor. Because of terrorist attacks that claimed the lives of thousands of Americans as well as nationals from many other countries, new regulations have been put into effect to help ensure the safety of all persons in the United States — citizens, residents, and visitors as well. We appreciate your understanding and cooperation in complying with the special registration procedures.

HOW TO COMPLY

Now that you have been fingerprinted and photographed, and interviewed about your plans during your stay in the United States, there are a few more special registration procedures that you must follow. Please take the time to read these instructions carefully. Keep them with you, as it is your legal responsibility to follow them.

- If you remain in the United States for 30 days or longer, you must report in person to an INS office (a list is attached) between day 30 and day 40 and show that you are following your travel plans or the statement of intentions made when you entered;
- If you remain for more than 1 year, you must report in person to an INS
 office within 10 days of the anniversary of the date when you last were
 admitted to the United States and show that you are following your travel
 plans or statement of intentions made when you entered;
- If you change your address, your employergror school-after remaining in the United States for 30 days or more, you must notify the Immigration and Naturalization Service in writing within 10 days of the change;
- 4. When you leave the United States (after October 1, 2002), you must appear in person before an INS inspecting officer at a designated port of departure (a list is attached) and leave from that port on the same day.

This document provides additional information and helpful tips to make it easier for you to follow the special registration procedures.

30 DAY AND 1 YEAR INTERVIEWS

Who must report for an interview?

At this time, anyone who has been fingerprinted and photographed at a United States port of entry on or after September 11, 2002, as part of the special registration procedures and who intends to stay 30 days or longer must report for an interview, unless they have applied for and received a waiver from an INS District Director.

A walver of all or part of the special registration requirement(s) for up to one year may be requested in writing from an INS District Director. There is no form to request a waiver; a letter is sufficient. Examples of the circumstances that might warrant a waiver include: a representative of a foreign government who was issued a visitor's visa in lieu of a diplomatic visa, an individual who should be exempt from special registration but was registered in error (such as an individual traveling with a diplomat's visa), or emergent medical circumstances (such as those requiring hospitalization) during the interview period. If the waiver is not approved in writing before the interview period, you should appear for the interview.

If you have applied for asylum in the United States, but were registered when you entered, you must still appear for the 30 day and 1 year interviews until either your asylum application has been approved or you depart the United States.

When must I report for the interview?

If you stay in the United States for 30 days or more, you must report to an INS office between day 30 and day 40 for the interview. For example, If you enter the United States on October 10 your should appear at an INS office between November 8 – 18. To determine the days when you should appear for your interview, fill out the following:

If you stay in the United States for 2 or more years, you should report to an INS office between these dates each year.

You do not need an appointment for your interview; but you should come in the moming. You will be seen on the same day that you come in. Most INS offices are open Monday through Friday, except on Federal holidays. For your convenience, please call the National Customer Support Center toll-free (1-800-375-5283) to find out when a specific INS office is open for business:

Where must I go for an interview?

You can go to the INS District or Sub-office closest to where you are located in the United States when the date for your interview occurs. A list of the District and Sub-offices is attached for your information. It is also available on the Internet at www.INS.usdoi.gov, and by telephone from the National Customer Service Center (1-800-375-5283 or TTY 1-800-767-1833 for the hearing impaired).

When you get to the INS office, let an INS employee or security guard know that you are there for a special registration interview. An INS Information Officer will request proof of identity, such as your passport, and then direct you to the officer who will conduct your interview.

What will happen at the interview?

At the interview, you will be fingerprinted and photographed again to verify your identity. If necessary, you may bring someone to translate for you. You should bring your Form I-94 (Arrival – Departure Record) and any written documents available to show the interviewing officer that you are doing what you said you were going to do when you entered the United States. For example:

- If you are visiting the United States as a tourist, you could bring hotel receipts, ticket stubs from places that you have gone or transportation that you have used, credit card receipts in your name that indicate a city or state that you have visited, etc.
- If you are staying with friends or relatives, you could bring documents showing their name and address, such as a postmarked envelope or bill.
- If you are in the United States because of a job, you could bring a payroll stub, an employment contract, etc.
- If you are in the United States to go to school, you could bring your class schedule, official notification of your grade(s), your class or yearbook picture, student identification card, evidence of participation in extracurricular activities, etc.

For the purpose of the interview, it is in your favor to think creatively and to bring as much documentation as possible. You may also be asked additional questions of a national security or law enforcement nature.

At the end of the interview, if the officer is satisfied, your Form I-94 will be marked to indicate that you appeared for your 30 day (or annual) interview. The interviewing officer could also extend the interview and ask you to come back within 7 days with additional documentation, or ask that you be interviewed by another INS officer.

CHANGE OF ADDRESS/EMPLOYER/SCHOOL

If you change your address, employer or school after you have been in the United States for 30 days or longer, you must notify INS by mail within 10 days of the change. You should use a Form AR-11 SR (Alien's Change of Address Card – Special Registration). A copy of the form is attached for your convenience. It is also available on the Internet at www.INS.usdoi.gov, by mail from the INS Forms Distribution Center (1-800-870-3979), and at INS District and Sub-offices.

When completing the form, you should:

- copy the FIN (Fingerprint Identification Number) that was written on your I-94 (Arrival – Departure Record) either when you entered the United States or at your 30 day interview to the last line on the form where indicated, and
- · mail to the address noted on the form.

While not required, it is to your benefit to keep a copy of your completed form and to request and keep a receipt to document the date on which you mailed the AR-11 SR and the address to which it was mailed.

DEPARTING THE UNITED STATES

If you leave the United States after October 1, 2002, Including visits to Mexico, Canada, or adjacent islands, you must notify INS on the date of your departure and leave through a designated port. If you do not report your departure, you may be denied admission to the United States at a later date. A list of the designated ports and instructions on where to register your departure is attached for your information. It is also available on the Internet at www.INS.usdoj.gov, and from the National Customer Service Center (1-800-375-5283 or TTY 1-800-767-1833 for the hearing impaired).

If you are just passing through the United States en route to another country and you are intending to depart from a non-designated port, your departure information will be collected during the arrival registration.

NON-COMPLIANCE

If you do not comply with the special registration requirements or other terms of your admission to the United States during your stay, you will be considered out of status. You may be subject to arrest, detention, fines and/or removal from the United States, and any future application for an immigration benefit from the United States may be impacted. Decisions will be made on an individual basis, dependent on the circumstances of each case.

From Bisbee, continue for approximately 30 miles on Highway 80 Bast until you reach Douglas, AZ. At the first stoplight make a right turn onto Pan American Avenue. You will travel on Pan American Avenue for approximately 15 blocks and you will then see the Douglas Port of Entry.

SPECIAL REGISTRATION PROCEDURES

[Text Version]

The United States has a proud tradition of welcoming immigrants and visitors. This tradition is renewed and enriched by each and every low-abiding immigrant and visitor. This same tradition is reflected in the United States government's duty to serve and protect its citizens, residents and foreign visitors.

Terrorist attacks have claimed the lives of thousands of Americans, as well as nationals from many other countries. As a result, new regulations have gone into effect to help ensure the safety of all persons in the United States. These regulations require the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) to register certain individuals in the interest of national security or law enforcement.

We understand that in many cases these procedures may cause inconvenience. However, your cooperation is requested so that our vision in which citizens, immigrants and visitors can live without fear of terrogist threats will become a reality.

Special Registration Procedures require:

- Being registered upon arrival to and departure from the United States;
- Being interviewed at an INS office if remaining in the United States for more than 30 days and/or for more than one year;
- Notifying the INS within ten days of any changes regarding place of residence, employment or education institution.

Who has to follow the special registration procedures?

As part of the nonimmigrant visa application process, consular officers at U.S. Embassies and Consulates are required to identify individuals who will have to follow the special registration requirements in the United States. Likewise, INS officers at ports of entry may identify nonimmigrants who will have to follow the special registration requirements.

The above will apply only to persons who want to enter the United States for a temporary period of time (such as a tourist or a student, etc.). Persons who have been approved to stay permanently in the United States do not have to follow special registration procedures at this time.

ENTERING THE UNITED STATES

What will happen when I come to the United States?

An INS officer will inform you if you will need to follow the special registration procedures. You will be instructed to go to an area where you will be fingerprinted, photographed, asked to show documents, and interviewed as to the length and purpose of your stay in the United States.

Additional information on how to follow the special registration procedures will be provided to you when you are registered.

If I'm traveling with family members, what will happen to them when we enter the United States?

You may be temporarily separated from your family for the length of time required to carry out the described special registration procedural steps. Depending on individual circumstances, some or all of your family members may also be required to follow the special registration procedures, in which case they too will be fingerprinted and photographed.

What if I decide that I do not want to complete the special registration procedures?

If you decide that you do not want to or can not follow the special registration procedures, you may be allowed to withdraw your application for admission into the United States. Such a decision on your part will result in not being granted permission to enter the United States. You may still be fingerprinted, photographed, and interviewed by an INS inspecting officer as part of the withdrawal process.

WHILE YOU ARE IN THE U.S.

Am I required to do anything while I am in the United States?

Yes. If you are subject to the special registration procedures and you remain in the United States for 30 or more days, you need to go to the nearest INS district or sub-office that has responsibility for the area where you are staying. You can do this any time beginning on the 30th calendar day from the day they you entered the United States and up to the 40th calendar day. You will not need an appointment.

If you remain in the United States for one year or more, you must report again in person to an INS district or sub-office, each and every year. You must do this in person no later than 10 calendar days from the anniversary of the date when you last entered the United States. No appointment is necessary.

What will happen to me at the INS district or sub-office?

Your identity will be verified by fingerprint and the information that you provided to the INS at the time that you were initially registered will be reviewed.

Additionally, you will need to prove that you are complying with the terms of your admission to the United States. When you are registered upon entry into United States, you will be given instructions as to what to bring with you to the INS district or sub-office.

How will I know where the INS district offices are located?

A list of INS Offices will be given to you when you are registered. Additionally, you can find the location of the INS district offices by calling the INS National Customer Service Center at 800 375-5283, or by using the Internet (www.ins.usdoi.gov).

What if I'm traveling to different places in the United States during my visit?

You can be interviewed at the INS district or sub-office closest to where you are travelling. You will need to bring documents to show who and where you are visiting.

What if the information I gave changes because I change my address, my school or where I am working?

You must notify the \$35 of any changes of address, employment; or school that you are attending. . within 10 calendar days from the time the change occurs. Submitting a Form AR-11. Alien's Change of Address Card, following the Special Registration Instructions, does this.

What will happen to me if I stay more than 30 days in the country and I do not report to the district office as required?

Depending on the circumstances, you may be subject to arrest and detention, fines, and/or removal from the United States. You could also be dealed to early into the United States for many years.

Once I am in the United States, are there steps I can take so that I do not have to comply with the registration procedures?

You will need to provide a written explanation as to why you should be excused from the special registration procedures. Your request should be sent to the INS district office that has responsibility for the area where you are staying. You must follow all special registration procedures until the INS notifies you in writing that your request has been approved.

LEAVING THE UNITED STATES.

What do the special registration proceduces mean for me when I leave or travel outside of the United States?

If you leave the United States on or after October 1, 2002, it is your responsibility to make certain that your departure is known and documented by an INS inspecting officer, each and every time you leave.

On or after October 1, 2002, you are required to report your departure from the United States by appearing before an INS inspecting officer on the same day that you leave.

These new regulations include restrictions as to which airports, scaports or land entry/exit points that you can use to depart from the United States. When you are initially registered, you will be given a list of those airports, seaports or overland exit ports you can use to leave the United States.

What will happen to me if I caunot or if I choose not to report my departure from the United States?

Depending on your personal circumstances, you might not be permitted to return to the United States. A consular officer or an INS inspecting officer will decide if the reasons you give for failing to report your departure satisfy the conditions set by the Attorney General and the Secretary of State that would allow you to re-enter the country.

If I have already registered at an immigration office and then I leave the United States, do I have to register again when I return?

Yes. You will have to begin this process again each time you enter the United States.

SPECIAL CALL-IN REGISTRATION PROCEDURES FOR CERTAIN NONIMMIGRANT ALIENS

THIS NOTICE IS FOR YOU

- If you are a national or citizen of Iran, Iraq, Libya, Sudan, or Syria
 and were inspected by the Immigration and Naturalization Service and last
 admitted to the United States as a nonimmigrant on or before September 10,
 2002; and
- If you are a male, born on or before November 15, 1986; and
- If you will be in the United States at least until December 16, 2002.

WHAT YOU NEED TO DO

- You must come to a designated INS office to be registered (photographed, fingerprinted, and interviewed under oath) between November 15 and December 16, 2002.
- 2./ If you remain in the United States for more than 1 additional year, you must report back to a designated INS office within 10 days of the anniversary of the date on which you first registered. For example, if you were registered November 20, 2002, you would report back between November 10 and November 30, 2003.
- If you change your address, employment, or educational institution, you must notify the INS in writing within 10 days of the change, using Form AR-11 SR.
- 4. If you leave the United States, you must appear in person before an INS inspecting officer at one of the designated ports and leave the United States from that port on the same day.

IT IS VITAL THAT YOU COMPLY

If you do not fellows these procedures, you may be considered to be out of status and deportable. You may be subject to arrest, detention, fines and/or removal from the United States. Any future application for an immigration benefit from the United States may be adversely impacted. If you do not properly exit through a designated port, any future attempts to reenter the United States may be impacted. Decisions will be made on an individual basis; depending on the circumstances of each case.

SPECIAL CALL-IN REGISTRATION PROCEDURES FOR CERTAIN NONIMMIGRANT ALIENS

Questions and Answers

WHY IS THE U.S. GOVERNMENT DOING THIS?

In light of the attacks against the United States on September 11, 2001 and subsequent events, and based on information available to the Attorney General, the Attorney General has determined that certain nonlimingrant aliens require closer monitoring when national security or law enforcement interests are raised. The first phase of Special Registration, initiated September 11, 2002, required selected individuals to be fingerprinted, photographed, and interviewed under oath at United States ports-of-entry. This new procedure is the second phase, extending registration requirements to nationals and citizens of designated countries, who already have been admitted to the United States, to register at an Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) district or sub-office.

The Attorney General has the legal authority to make this determination under section 265 (b) of the Immigration and Nationality Act, as amended, 8 U.S.C. 1305(b); and under section 263 (a) of the Immigration and Nationality Act, 8 U.S.C. 1303(a).

We appreciate your understanding and cooperation in complying with these registration procedures.

WHO WILL THIS AFFECT?

Males, 16 years of age or older (born on or before November 15, 1986), who are nationals or citizens of Iran, Iraq, Libya, Syria, and Sudan, who were inspected and last admitted by the INS as a nonimmigrant on or before September 10, 2002, and who will remain in the United States at least until December 16, 2002.

WHY ARE ONLY MUSLIMS AND ARABS REQUIRED TO REGISTER?
To date, individuals from over 114 countries have been registered. Registration is based solely on nationality and citizenship, not on ethnicity or religion.

The INS is required, within three years, to track all of the estimated 35 million foreign visitors, students, business travelers, and tourists who enter and leave the United States each year to also requires that, by 2004; all official travelses

documents used to enter the United States contain blometric identifiers (e.g., fingerprints) in addition to photo identification. This requirement is made necessary given the number of fraudulent documents presented to the INS and the use of sophisticated imaging technology to conceal and falsify identities.

The National Security Entry and Exit Registration System is an important first phase in implementing the entry/exit program that will cover all visitors to the United States. Presently, any number of nationals, from any country, can be required to follow special registration procedures when the Attorney General determines it is in the national security and/or law enforcement interests of the United States.

It is important to emphasize that the National Security Entry and Exit Registration System is not a bar to entry into the United States, nor does it limit an individual's ability to engage in any lawful activity as permitted under their entry visa.

ARE THERE ANY EXCEPTIONS?

Yes. This does <u>not</u> affect individuals who are currently lawful permanent residents of the United States ("green card holders"). Refugees, individuals who have been granted asylum, and individuals who have applied for asylum on or before November 6, 2002, are also excluded.

In addition, diplomats and their dependents, individuals with diplomatic visas, as well as representatives and employees from accredited international organizations are excluded from the Special Registration Procedures.

WHAT ABOUT MY DEPENDENTS, SUCH AS MY SPOUSE, CHILDREN OR PARENTS; DO THEY HAVE TO REGISTER?
All males who are 16 years or older (born on or before November 15, 1986) must register.

WHAT IF MY SPOUSE, CHILDREN OR PARENTS ARE U.S. CITIZENS OR
TEGAL PERMANENT RESIDENTS? DO I STILL HAVE TO RESISTER?

Yes. There are no exceptions based on the immigration status of other family members.

WHAT IF I HAVE QUAL CITIZENSHIP)? DO I STILL HAVE TO REGISTER? Yes. Those who claim citizenship from Iran, Iraq, Libya, Sudan or Syria are required to register even if they are also citizens of another country.

WHAT IF I AM IN THE PROCESS OF APPLYING TO BECOME A PERMANENT RESIDENT, BUT MY APPLICATION IS STILL WITH THE INS? DO I STILL HAVE TO REGISTER?

Yes. There are no exceptions based only on filling an application to adjust one's immigration status to that of a legal permanent resident.

WHAT IF I HAVE APPLIED FOR ASYLUM? DO I STILL HAVE TO REGISTER?

Maybe. If you applied for asylum on or before November 6, 2002, you do not have to register. If you applied for asylum after that date, you will have to register. If you have been granted asylum, you do not have to register.

WHAT IF I HAVE BEEN IN THE UNITED STATES FOR MANY YEARS BECAUSE I WAS GIVEN TEMPORARY PROTECTED STATUS (TPS) STATUS? DO I STILL HAVE TO REGISTER?

Yes, as long as you were last admitted to the United States as a nonimmigrant on or before September 10, 2002. Even if you have been allowed to stay legally in the United States for many years, you are still required to register.

WHAT IF MY LAST ENTRY TO THE UNITED STATES WAS NOT LEGAL (WITHOUT INSPECTION AND ADMISSION), AND I NOW HAVE TEMPORARY PROTECTED STATUS (TPS)? DO I HAVE TO REGISTER?

No. The current Special Call-In Registration requirements apply only to aliens who have been inspected by an Immigration officer and admitted to the United States.

WHAT IF I WAS PAROLED INTO THE UNITED STATES? DO I HAVE TO REGISTER?

No. If your last entry into the United States was on or before September 10, 2002, and you'were not inspected and admitted as a nonimmigrant, you are not subject to Special Registration.

WHAT IF I AM CURRENTLY SUBJECT TO SPECIAL CALL-IN REGISTRATION, BUT I DEPART THE UNITED STATES PRIOR TO DECEMBER 16, 2000? WILL I HAVE TO REGISTER IF I COME BACK TO THE UNITED STATES?

You are not subject to Special Call-In Registration if you depart before December 16, 2002. However, if you leave the United States and return, you may be registered at the Port-of-Entry if you are admitted and are subject-to-as registration at that time. The criteria for registration at Ports-of-Entry may be different from the criteria for Call-In Registration.

WHERE DO LGOMO REGISTER?

You can go to the designated INS District or Sub-office closest to where you are located in the United States. A list of the District and Sub-offices is attached for your information. It is also available on the Internet at www.INS.usdoi.gov, and by telephone from the National Customer Service Center (1-800-375-5283 or TTY 1-800-767-1833 for the treating impaired).





WHEN DO I HAVE TO DO THIS?

You must appear in person before, register with, and provide requested information under oath to an Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) officer between November 15, 2002 and December 16, 2002.

DO ! HAVE TO MAKE AN APPOINTMENT?

You do not need an appointment to be registered; but you should come in the morning. You will be seen on the same day that you come in. Most INS offices are open Monday through Friday, except on Federal holidays. For your convenience, please call the National Customer Service Center toll-free (1-800-375-5283) to find out when a specific INS office is open for business:

WHO DO I ASK FOR AT THE INS OFFICE?

When you get to the INS office, let an INS employee or security guard know that you are there as part of the Special Registration procedures. An INS Information Officer will request proof of identity, such as your passport, and then direct you to the officer who will register you.

WHAT WILL HAPPEN WHEN I GO TO REGISTER?

At the interview, you will be fingerprinted and photographed. You need to bring your passport and Form I-94 (Arrival – Departure Record), any other forms of government-issued identification documents that you have been issued, and proof of residence, employment or school matriculation. For example:

- If you are living in the United States, you could bring a lease or rental agreement, utility bills, etc. to show where you live:
- If you are staying with friends or relatives, you could bring documents such as a postmarked envelope or bill showing their name and address.
- If you are in the United States because of a Job, you could bring a payroli stub, an employment contract, etc.
- If you are in the United States to go to school, you could bring your class
 schedule, official notification of your grade(s), your class or yearbook picture,
 student identification card, evidence of participation in extracurricular activities, etc.

You may also be asked additional questions of a national security or law enforcement nature. The interviewing officer could also ask another INS officer to interview you.

If necessary, you should bring someone to translate for you. A parent or jegal guardian may accompany juveniles under the age of 18. Legal representation is not necessary, but at your option, you may be represented at your own expense by the legal counsel of your choice.



When you have been registered, the officer will mark your Form I-94 to indicate that you have complied with the registration requirement. If you have lost your Form I-94, you may apply for a replacement at the time of registration. You will have to file an application and pay any required filing fee to replace the lost document. The filing fee is currently \$85.

WHAT IF I MISS THE DECEMBER 16, 2002 DEADLINE?

if you are not able to appear at an INS District or Sub-office between November 15 and December 16, 2002, you should come in as soon as possible thereafter. Be prepared to explain and document why you were unable to register by December 16, 2002. If the INS officer determines that you did not willfully ignore the registration requirement, you will be registered.

WILL I BE GIVEN ANY PROOF THAT I HAVE COMPLIED?

Yes. Your I-94 (Arrival - Departure Record) will be annotated with a Fingerprint Identification Number (FIN) to show that you have registered. If you do not have an I-94, you may apply for a replacement. The I-94 card is an important document for Special Registration procedures. You will need to present your I-94 card each time that an INS officer interviews you, and surrender it when you leave the United States.

DO I HAVE TO REGISTER EVERY YEAR?

If you stay in the United States for 1 year or longer after the date you were . registered, you must report to an INS office for an annual interview within 10 days of the anniversary of the day on which you were registered. For example, if you were registered on December 10, 2002 you will need to appear again at a designated INS office between the dates of November 30 - December 20, 2003. To determine your dates:

If you stay in the United States for 2 or more years, you should report to an INS office between those same dates each year.

You do not need an appointment for your interview; but you should come in the morning. You will be seen on the same day that you come in.. Most INS offices... are open Monday Through Friday, except on Federal holidays. For your convenience, please call the National Customer Support Center toll-free (1-800-375-5283) to find out when a specific INS office is open for business.

WHAT IF I CHANGE MY ADDRESS? SCHOOL? OR EMPLOYER? If you change your address, employer or school after you have been in the United States for 30 days or longer, you must notify INS by mail within 10 days of the change. You should use a Form AR-11 SR (Alien's Change of Address Card Special Registration). A copy of the form is attached for your convenience. It

is also available on the Internet at <u>www.tNS.usdoi.gov</u>, by mail from the tNS Forms Distribution Center (1-800-870-3979), and at tNS District and Sub-offices.

When completing the form, you should copy the Fingerprint Identification Number (FIN) that was written on your I-94 (Arrival – Departure Record) form or passport when you were registered and fingerprinted by the INS to the top of your Form AR-11 SR (Alien's Change of Address Card – Special Registration) and to the last line on the AR-11 SR where indicated. If, for some reason, you do not have your FIN number, use the number of your I-94 (Arrival – Departure Record). You can also use your alien registration number if you have been given one by the INS-

Mail to the address noted in the instruction section on the AR-11 SR form. While not required, it is to your benefit to keep a copy of your completed form and a receipt of delivery that can be used to document the date on which you submitted the Form and the address to which it was mailed.

DO I NEED TO REPORT TO THE INS WHEN I LEAVE THE UNITED STATES? Yes. When you leave the United States, including for visits to Mexico, Canada, or adjacent islands, you must notify the INS in person on the date of your departure and leave through a designated port. If you do not report your departure, you may be defied admission to the United States at a later date.

CAN I LEAVE FROM ANY AIRPORT, SEAPORT, OR LAND BORDER CROSSING?

No. You will only be allowed to leave the United States from certain designated ports. These include international airports, seaports and land border crossings into Canada and Mexico. A list of the designated ports and instructions on where to register your departure is attached for your information. This list is also available on the Internet at www.INS.usdoi.gov, and from the National Customer Service Center (1-800-375-5283 or TTY 1-800-767-1833 for the hearing impaired). Please consult this listing when planning your travel as newly designated ports may be added by Federal Register notice at any time.

IS THERE A WAIVER PROVISION FOR CALL-IN REGISTRATION?

No. Everyone required to register must do so. After registering, a waiver of all or part of the special registration requirement(s) for up to one year may be requested in writing from an INS District Director. There is no form to request a waiver, a letter is sufficient. Examples of the circumstances that might warrant a waiver include: a representative of a foreign government who was issued a visitor's visa in lieu of a diplomatic visa, an emergent medical circumstances (such as those requiring hespitalization) during the interview period. If the waiver is not approved in writing before the annual interview period, you should appear for the interview.

WILL I NEED TO BE INTERVIEWED, FINGERPRINTED, AND PHOTOGRAPHED EVERY TIME I ENTER THE UNITED STATES?

Yes. Nonimmigrant aliens who are nationals or citizens of Iran, Iraq, Libya, Sudan, and Syria are required to register each time they are inspected by an Immigration inspections officer and admitted to the United States.

If you do not comply with these special registration requirements or other terms of your admission to the United States during your stay, you will be considered out of status. You may be subject to arrest, detention, fines and/or removal from the United States, and any future application for an immigration benefit from the United States may be impacted. Decisions will be made on an individual basis, dependent on the circumstances of each case.
